#### MANAGEMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

#### **Food Scraps Pickup Program Website and Maintenance Vendor Selection**

Presented by: Jim Redmond, Contract Manager

The website is one of the core components of the Food Scraps Pickup Program. Staff are looking to enhance the user experience and make data and statistics more accessible internally as a significant number of residents will become eligible for the program over the next 18 months. A request for proposals (RFP) was sent out, and three proposals were received. Staff from Ramsey and Washington Counties, along with R&E's IT consultant, reviewed the proposals; two finalists were interviewed. The evaluation team and executive director recommended the approval of Metre as the provider.

Staff are currently unable to make edits to the website. The improvements will allow staff to make edits and updates. Programming, coding and backup services will be provided by Metre. The changes will result in long-term savings and are within amounts approved for the current budget.

#### **Personnel Complement Additions**

Presented by Trista Martinson, Executive Director

Martinson recommended hiring four positions originally approved in the 2026-2027 budgets early, in the last quarter of 2025. Funds are available to support the hiring with small adjustments to current contracts. R&E is preparing for the new sortation facilities. The goal is to hire in early October.

A motion was made by Xiong, seconded by Miron, to approve Resolution R&EB 2025-11 Personnel Complement Additions. Motion passed.

#### **Electric Vehicle - Yard Tractor Procurement**

The R&E Board approved the 2026-2027 Equipment Maintenance & Replacement (EM&R) Budget on July 24, 2025. R&E was also awarded a grant in the amount of \$150,936 from the Minnesota Pollution

Control Agency (MPCA). Federal legislation for additional funds, which were originally to be available through December 2032, will now expire on September 30, 2025. To take advantage of this additional funding, this item is being presented to purchase an electric yard tractor for the R&E Center.

The equipment is being purchased locally, and the grant requires that an old vehicle be retired. R&E will decommission a diesel tractor, which will then be recycled.

A motion was made by Miller, seconded by Bigham to approve Resolution R&EB 2025-12 Electric Vehicle – Yard Tractor Procurement. Motion passed.

#### **UPDATES AND REPORTS**

#### **Executive Director Update**

Presented by: Trista Martinson, Executive Director

Staff participation in Secondhand Wardrobe Day was noted, recognizing staff's demonstration of R&E values. Martinson and R&E staff presented on the MN State Fair's Eco Experience Building stage. The audience was very responsive. Ramsey County residents showed excitement for their opportunity to participate in the Food Scraps Pickup Program. Martinson will also be presenting with a panel at the Association of Minnesota Counties (AMC) Policy Committees Conference on September 11 and a September Solid Waste Administrators Conference.

Commissioner Bigham noted the AMC Solid Waste Management Group's work on advancement of state legislation. The group will meet again in October to discuss solid waste districts. A section on commissioner updates will be added to the regular R&E Board meeting agenda.

Martinson's one-year work anniversary occurred in August 2025. A workplan is in progress, and a review is planned for the October 23 R&E Board meeting via closed session. A 360 review will be completed.

#### **Strategic Partnerships Update**

Presented by: Melissa Finnegan, Strategic Partnership Manager

Finnegan provided an update on the status of R&E grant applications, including funds for the yard tractor purchase, anaerobic digestion, a flail mill rebuild and solar for public buildings. The solar grant approval will include qualifying for additional federal reimbursement.

#### **Facility Update**

Presented by: Sam Holl, Facility Director

Holl reported all plants are currently operational. Communication will be going out to haulers in September about the 2026 tipping fee increase. In addition, Holl will be meeting in person with a group of haulers to discuss the tipping fee. A hauler and staff appreciation picnic will be held at R&E on September 24. Transfer stations equipped with food scrap bag sortation will be coming on board in phases, and all are scheduled to be up and running by July 2026.

#### **Procurement Report**

Presented by: Jim Redmond, Contract Manager

Redmond presented the report for July 2025. There were six contracts executed: four related to the facility and two related to programs. It was noted that \$106,125.09 in grant funding was distributed throughout Ramsey and Washington Counties to support waste reduction and recycling.

#### Staff Presentation on Background of Strategic Plan

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

Ramsey/Washington Recycling & Energy (R&E) entered into a feedstock supply agreement with DC/HZI effective September 7, 2023. Two other amendments to the agreement have been approved on October 14, 2024 and November 14, 2024.

The third amendment proposes changing the anaerobic commencement date from July 31, 2027 to December 31, 2027. The change in commencement date is a result of uncertainty of the tariff impact to this project.

The amendment also proposes that additional grant finding received by R&E and DC/HZI beyond the initial agreed upon amount of \$31,097,000, will cover tariffs incurred up to the commencement date by this project up to \$5,000,000 before further reducing the feedstock tipping fee beyond agreed to tipping fee.

# RESOLUTION R&EB-2025-13 Anaerobic Digestion Third Contract Amendment

WHEREAS, The Ramsey/Washington Recycling & Energy Board (R&E Board) is governed by the Amended and Restated Joint Powers Agreement by and between Ramsey County and Washington County dated November 12, 2024 (Joint Powers Agreement); and

WHEREAS, Ramsey and Washington Counties have committed to continue to protect and ensure the public health, safety, welfare and environment of each county's residents and businesses through sound management of solid and hazardous waste generated in each county; and

WHEREAS, Ramsey and Washington Counties have County Solid Waste Management Plans (Management Plans) approved by the Commissioner of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, which state the policy goal of maintaining and improving an integrated system of solid waste management that supports Minnesota's hierarchy of solid waste management, with an emphasis on waste reduction, reuse, recycling and composting before the remaining solid waste is managed through resource recovery; and

WHEREAS, R&E executed an organic material feedstock supply agreement with Dem-Con HZI BioEnergy, LLC (DC/HZI) on September 7, 2024 (Agreement); and

WHEREAS, DC/HZI was unable to certify pricing within 12 months, and the Agreement allowed the R&E Board an option for early termination within 60 days; and

WHEREAS, On October 24, 2024, the R&E Board approved a first amendment to the Agreement extending the early termination deadline to December 31, 2024, to allow for additional negotiations; and

WHEREAS, On November 14, 2024, the R&E Board approved the second amendment to the Agreement revises and certifies organic food scraps (OFS) and organic-rich material (ORM) pricing for R&E and identifies additional feedstocks and grant funds required to obtain the desired pricing terms by the anaerobic digestion (AD) commencement date; and

WHEREAS, On November 14, 2024, the R&E Board approved the second amendment to the Agreement revises and certifies OFS and ORM pricing for R&E; and

WHEREAS, On July 4, 2025 the One Big Beautiful Bill Act was signed into law creating ta riffs on equipment used for this project that cannot be produced domestically; and

WHEREAS, Additional grant funds received by either R&E or DC/HZI beyond the agreed upon amount for this project (will be used to cover tariffs incurred by this project before further reducing the tipping; and

WHEREAS, DC/HZI has indicated the need for additional time to complete financial close without impacting contractual deadlines. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, The R&E Board approves the third amendment to the Agreement between DC/HZI and the R&E Board with updated commencement date to December 31, 2027. BE IT FURTHER

RESOLVED, The R&E Board authorizes the R&E Board Chair to execute the third amendment to the Agreement dated September 25, 2025, following approval as to form by the County Attorney.

# Third Amendment to Feedstock Supply Agreement

Between Dem-Con HZI BioEnergy, LLC and Ramsey/Washington Recycling and Energy Board

This Third Amendment ("Third Amendment") t	o the Feedstock Supply Agreement
("Agreement") is made and entered into on	, 2025, by and between Dem-Con HZI
BioEnergy, LLC ("Operator") and Ramsey/Was	hington Recycling and Energy Board
("Supplier"). The Operator and Supplier are coll	ectively referred to as the "Parties."

#### **Recitals**

WHEREAS, the Parties entered into the Agreement effective September 7, 2023, whereby the Supplier agreed to provide organic material for the Operator to process into renewable natural gas, biochar, and other products; and

WHEREAS, the Agreement was amended by the Parties via the First Amendment to Feedstock Supply Agreement (dated October 24, 2024), and Second Amendment to Feedstock Supply Agreement (dated November 14, 2024; the "Second Amendment"); and

WHEREAS, the Second Amendment amended Section 1.5 such that July 31, 2027, was set as the AD Commencement Target Date; and

WHEREAS, since entering into the Second Amendment, the United States has imposed substantially higher tariffs on certain imports, including those that are necessary to construct the Plant; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the adjusted tariffs that have already been identified, the Parties have encountered significant uncertainty with respect to applicable taxes, regulations, and other potential tariffs and such uncertainty has impeded Operator's ability to both achieve AD Commencement by the AD Commencement Target Date or the AD Commencement Outside Date and maintain the project's overall financial viability; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to amend the Agreement to provide relief from such dates in light of the above-referenced uncertainty.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the Parties agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

- 1. Section 1.5 is amended to replace July 31, 2027, with December 31, 2027, as the new **AD** Commencement Target Date.
- 2. Section 1.4 is hereby deleted and replaced with the following: "AD Commencement Outside Date' means the date Twelve (12) months following the AD Commencement Target Date, as such AD Commencement Target Date is (i) extended due to a Permitted Delay; or (ii) amended by the Parties."

- **3.** Section 3.2(b)(4), as amended by the Second Amendment, is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:
  - 4) Deviations from Total Grant Funds Target.
    - a) In the event the total net amount of Grant Funds and Additional Funding obtained by Supplier and delivered to Operator ("Total Grant Funds") is less than Thirty Million Eight Hundred Ninety Seven Thousand Dollars (\$30,897,000.00), net of administrative and other fees and expenses ("Target Grant Funds"), the Minimum Pricing Fees shall increase by One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50) per ton for each One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) below the Target Grant Funds.
    - b) In the event the Total Grant Funds exceeds the Target Grant Funds, such "Excess Grant Funds" (defined as the positive difference between Total Grant Funds minus Target Grant Funds) shall be applied as follows: (i) the first Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) of Excess Grant Funds ("Initial Excess Grant Funds") shall have no effect on the Minimum Pricing Fees but instead be considered additional compensation to Operator to offset any tariff costs existing as of the date of this Third Amendment (including any tariffs incurred directly on imported finished products and any tariffs incurred indirectly through the purchase of finished products that contain imported components), hereinafter the "Tariff Costs."
    - c) Operator agrees that Excess Grant Funds shall only include Grant Funds received by Supplier for construction or operation of the Plant and shall not include any other grant funds received by Supplier for any other projects undertaken by Supplier (such as for Supplier's Food Scrap Pickup program). Further, Operator agrees that it shall continue to seek Excess Grant Funds for construction and operation of the Plant and that any such Excess Grant Funds shall be applied to the Tariff Costs and proportionately reduce the Initial Excess Grant Fund amount. Operator also agrees that if the Tariff Costs are reduced after the date of this Third Amendment and before the AD Commencement Date, the Initial Excess Grant Funds amount shall be reduced proportionately to the amount of reduced Tariff Costs. The Parties agree that they shall continue to collaborate in seeking Grant Funds for the Plant.
    - d) Any additional Excess Grant Funds beyond the first Initial Excess Grant Funds amount shall be applied to decrease the Minimum Pricing Fees such that the Minimum Pricing Fees shall decrease by One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50) per ton, or an amount mutually agreed upon by the Parties at such time, for each One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) of the Excess Grant Funds beyond the Initial Excess Grant Funds amount.
    - e) Such Minimum Pricing Fees adjustment shall be proportional to the incremental amount of Additional Funding above or below the Target Grant Funds using a straight-line extrapolation for amounts above or below the \$1,000,000 threshold, shall be independent of any adjustment in Section 3.2(b)(5), and shall apply to both the Annual Commitment of OFS Feedstock

as well as the additional 15,500 tons of OFS Feedstock regardless of what amount of Additional Feedstock Supplier actually procures. For example:

- a. If Supplier delivers Total Grant Funds of \$30,697,000 (\$200,000 below the Target Grant Funds), the Minimum Pricing Fees shall increase by \$0.30 per ton.
- b. If Supplier delivers Total Grant Funds of \$31,097,000 (\$200,000 above the Target Grant Funds, meaning \$200,000 of Excess Grant Funds), such \$200,000 shall be delivered to Operator for the purpose of offsetting tariffs.
- c. If Supplier delivers Total Grant Funds of \$36,097,000 (\$5,200,000 above the Target Grant Funds, meaning \$5,200,000 of Excess Grant Funds), \$5,000,000 shall have no effect on the Minimum Pricing Fees but shall be considered an offset of the tariffs, and the remaining \$200,000 shall reduce the Minimum Pricing Fees such that the Minimum Pricing Fees shall decrease by \$0.30 per ton (or a similar increment mutually agreed upon by the Parties as stated above).
- **4.** Except as expressly amended by this Third Amendment, all other terms and conditions of the Agreement, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect. This Amendment may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument. Upon approval of this Third Amendment the Parties will produce a full restated version of the Agreement as amended.

#### **R&E BOARD ACTION REQUESTED:**

Adopt the Ramsey/Washington Recycling & Energy (R&E) 2025-2030 Strategic Plan.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

Through Ramsey and Washington Counties' longstanding collaboration on solid waste issues, R&E has been established as the critical pivot that the counties sought to reduce waste, increase recycling and recovery resources from discarded materials for community, economic and environmental benefit.

R&E has grown and evolved in the past several years due to:

- Increased responsibility in managing solid waste generated in the two counties
- New opportunities and initiatives at the local, state and federal level
- Recognition that progress toward R&E's vision of "vibrant, healthy communities without waste" requires major system changes in how solid waste is managed

R&E has not previously had a strategic plan, but it has been guided by several foundational strategic elements. While previous planning guidance is still germane, as R&E has grown, this guidance is no longer sufficient for effective progress. After the appointment of its executive director in August 2024, the R&E Board directed staff to develop a strategic plan for the organization to guide major decisions on direction and resource allocation in the coming years.

A strategic plan will provide a valuable tool for R&E leadership overseeing critical work and a unified, cohesive direction for staff across the organization. County solid waste management plans will continue to guide solid waste management policy in the east metro (the "what" and "when"). The R&E strategic plan provides the "how" – the approach and direction for R&E at a high level. The plan has a five-year horizon and a ten-year strategic vision. It is simple but powerful document, the core of which is its strategic imperatives, goals and initiatives.

Based on R&E's structure, needs, challenges and growth in responsibilities, planning staff and leadership shaped its strategic planning process using the *strategic realization model*. R&E has established several strategic elements to date, such as its values, vision and mission statements. It also has a robust strategic delivery structure through management of R&E's core operations and programming portfolios. The strategic plan addresses gaps in strategic alignment and execution by identifying:

• Strategic imperatives – the critical areas of change within the strategic plan time horizon that

moves R&E toward its vision; what R&E must do (i.e., is imperative) to succeed

- Strategic goals broad targets describing what success looks like under each imperative
- Strategic initiatives key, purposeful activities designed to address and fulfill strategic imperatives and goals

The strategic plan was drafted using robust engagement with R&E and county staff and leadership, community and partners and the R&E Board. Key staff from R&E and Ramsey and Washington Counties participated in workshops to shape and define the strategic plan elements. R&E also conducted a focus group of key partners and surveyed R&E Center tour participants to gain insight into partner and community needs. Recognizing comprehensive community engagement recently conducted by the counties on similar topics, R&E staff also analyzed several past surveys and focus group session data. These efforts included methodologies to ensure the respondent pool aligned with population demographics, such as:

- Location, including urban/suburban/rural areas
- Homeowners and renters
- Gender, age and ethnicity
- Language

The result of these efforts was an initial strategic plan draft that reflected the knowledge and leadership of key staff with expertise of lived experience from community members and partners.

On August 28, 2025, the R&E Board held a workshop to review and discuss the draft strategic plan content. The draft, as well as a memorandum further detailing the background and process for strategic planning, can be found in the August 28 R&E Board Workshop packet of materials. Board members provided important insights and direction that staff took back to further refine the plan. The revised plan and the prior version with tracked changes are attached in this packet. Additionally, the board asked that future board items include an indication of the strategic element being addressed. A draft board coversheet has also been provided for the board's consideration.
